#### LETTER FROM THE MINISTRY TEAM

Dear Friends,

I am writing this letter the week after our group of parishes have joined with people across the country and indeed across the world on Remembrance Sunday to commemorate the 100th anniversary of the ending of WW1. People gathered together to remember through words, music and silence. As November leads into December we look ahead to people coming together again in a variety of ways as we prepare for Christmas. Of course there is the shopping to do, gifts to buy, meals to prepare, visits to make. But for Christians and for the church there is much preparation to do as we ready ourselves for the season of Advent and Christmas and gather together to anticipate and celebrate the birth of Jesus through familiar readings, and singing familiar hymns and carols. The Christmas bookmark that accompanies Signpost will let you know what is going on and where in our churches throughout December. You are most welcome to join us.

In a few days I have the privilege of joining the Diocesan Pilgrimage to the Holy Land where we journey in the footsteps of Jesus. We will be visiting the sites associated with Jesus' birth, ministry, death and resurrection. This will be a first for me and I am not ever so sure what to expect. The Holy Land in the 21st century is a very different place from 2,000 years ago. Or is it?

At the time of Jesus' birth, it was under an occupying force, ruled by puppet kings, with an expectation among the religious that a new king was coming. It was a time of political intrigue and instability. Today it is a place of different cultures, faiths and countries and continues to be politically unstable. As part of the preparation for this pilgrimage an itinerary has been produced which will enable us to focus our thoughts on the places we will be visiting. It will be interesting to put some flesh on the places I have only ever read about and seen on the big screen.

But is it all going to be a bit too touristy as people from around the world make their pilgrimages? Christmas here can be a bit touristy too where the real reason Christmas is celebrated disappears under the trappings that have become part of the 'season to be jolly'.

Will the feeling of being where Jesus lived and died have an emotional and spiritual effect on us? How will we encounter God and Jesus in these places?

I shall look forward to sharing with you in the future some of the thoughts and encounters that will be experienced on the Pilgrimage.

After the Christmas rush things hopefully settle down as the new year and January appear. Resolutions are made in an attempt to be rid of excess Christmas dinner and I can hear some say 'how good to get back to normal.' Well I'm not sure that life is ever normal but perhaps back into a routine helps to give us a sense of normality. The normal pattern of Sunday services in the Owmby Group has been in place for about twenty years. Over the intervening years one or two services have been lost which has resulted in the distribution of services becoming a little disjointed.

Starting on January 6th a new pattern of services is being introduced which spreads the services more evenly across the group. Please check the service rota in Signpost to make sure you get to the right place at the right time!

A blessed Christmas and a peaceful New Year to all.

#### FROM THE OFFICE OF THE BISHOP OF LINCOLN

November was a time of remembrance. The Feast of All Saints, the Feast of All Souls, and we also remembered the end of the First World War.

There was not a single family in Britain, France and Germany unacquainted with grief; nor a corner of life unaffected. I was in Boston Stump for a festival of remembrance that included several exhibits about the impact of the war on the lives of the people of Boston.

For me the most graphic image was a street map of Boston in 1918 on which a black dot had been placed on each house where a family member had died in that conflict. Boston was much smaller then, but there was hardly a house without one or more dots - 200 in all.

Rather than people returning to a land fit for heroes, the soldiers who returned came home to unemployment and to a nation that did not show gratitude to those who fought for it. We have begun to learn this lesson.

War also led us to understand the nature of God in a different way.

During the war itself and in the decades that followed we uncovered something new in our understanding of God. Put simply: if God is loving and all-powerful, how could evil be allowed to flourish on this devastating scale? And why would we continue to trust in a God indifferent to our fate?

One person who wrestled with these questions was Geoffrey Studdert Kennedy. He was an army chaplain who earned the nickname Woodbine Willie for handing out cigarettes to the troops at the same time as copies of the New Testament.

Woodbine Willie insisted on being on the front line with the troops whenever he could. Those battlefield experiences forced him to confront depths of evil and suffering which few of us will ever see.

Having entered the war with a secure faith in God and an abstract notion of evil, he ended it being absolutely certain of the existence of evil as a real force at work in the world. The challenge, then, was to find a way to reconcile all that he had seen in the trenches with the existence of a God who was worth believing in.

For Woodbine Willie, hope came with an understanding that God was no longer the almighty force of his pre-war understanding, able to prevent humans from harming one another if he so chose. Instead, God was present in the heat of battle, suffering along with humanity, in the intolerable conditions of the trenches, in the endless slaughter of young lives. God was characterised not by force and power, but by love; no longer remote from all that was going on, but intimately connected with it and suffering through it.

God has planted in each one of us the greatest potential for love; and yet, evil exists and because evil often expresses itself in violence it has to be confronted with force and violence, whether between nations or within a nation.

After the war, despite everything he had seen, Woodbine Willie was able to write, 'The universe is as an "unfinished movement" in which the underlying melody is love.'

The God we believe in brings love out of hate; light out of darkness; justice out of oppression; good out of evil; life out of death. This is our God, and his name is Love. Our acts of remembrance during November helped us to prepare for the season of advent as we remember the first coming of Christ and prepare for his second coming. To remember helps us to be mindful of what it means for Christ to be born in us today.

This year saw the 100th Anniversary of the signing of the Armistice which marked the end of World War 1. Visiting the war memorial in Hackthorn and taking part in the service of remembrance, where our oldest and youngest pupils share in laying a wreath is one of the proud traditions of our school. This year, with the kind agreement of Rev Sally, something extra was added to the occasion as our pupils gave a rendition of two songs from the era - 'It's a Long Way to Tipperary', and 'Pack Up Your Troubles' - each sung separately and then simultaneously by two halves of the school. They gave a remarkable performance which will, no doubt, live long in the memories of all those in attendance at that special time.

The children have been further demonstrating their concern for the wider world by not only raising money for the poppy appeal, but also assembling a huge pile of Christmas boxes for the Samaritan's Purse charity. A stupendous total of 77 boxes were produced, a new record representing much more than 1 box for every pupil in the school, at this rate Mrs Rawson will be needing a bigger car next year! Year 5 and 6 pupils have also carried on their correspondence with the residents of Drovers Call Care Home. It is great to hear that the skills of traditional communication are being kept alive in the digital age.

#### WELTON FAMILY HEALTH CENTRE NEWS

**DNA** - In October we had 21 patients fail to attend for their GP appointments and 103 patients fail to attend for their nursing appointments. This amounts to 20.5 hours of appointments this month that have been wasted. If all of these patients had attended this would have given us an extra 5 bookable appointments EACH DAY! Please sign up for our text messaging service so we can send you reminders before your appointment.

'FLU VACCINATION CLINICS - As was the case last month, again we would like to apologise for anyone that had to wait at our second drop in 'flu clinic. We have no way of predicting how many patients will attend for the drop-in vaccination clinic and we are grateful to those patients that were happy to wait to be seen. We are trying to vaccinate as many patients as possible which has been complicated by a new regime of vaccines this year. We have reflected on this and improvements will be made for the clinics in 2019. We would also like to thank all the staff that have given up their weekends to provide this service for patients this year; they all do an excellent job of keeping us 'flu free!

**CLEANER VACANCY** - We currently have a vacancy for a cleaner in the Practice. The role is for two hours each evening, Monday to Friday. If you would like more information or an application form, please contact the surgery.

**DR ANDREW BARBER** - We are extremely sad to report that Dr Andrew Barber is very poorly with a rare and complicated lung condition which means he is not well enough to work.

As you would expect, this news has come as a shock to the Practice and for the second time this year we find ourselves in an unexpected position. The staff and the doctors at the surgery are working extremely hard to maintain our usual level of service and we appreciate the support of the patients and the PDA whilst we work through this. As always we will not tolerate any form of abuse or rudeness towards our staff who are only trying their best in the circumstances.

Some patients have kindly asked how they can help the practice at this difficult time:

- We would be grateful if patients would consider using the most appropriate resource when attending the surgery. There will be some information leaflets in and around the practice detailing who is the most appropriate source of help, which may include GPs, Nurse Practitioners, Nurses, Healthcare assistants, Pharmacists at local chemists etc. This helps us make the best possible use of the resources available to us.
- We would be grateful if patients try to understand that the Acute Illness clinic will be busy. As we are now in the middle of our busiest period of the year we notice that patients attend the Acute Illness clinic

when in fact some of these could have sought initial advice from a pharmacist. Please see our leaflets and posters for more information. Our Reception staff will soon be undertaking further training to be able to advise you on this.

- Patients that are waiting for outpatient appointments or information from hospitals or other providers, could we ask you to please contact the hospitals directly. Telephone numbers are usually available on your correspondence or online.
- Patients can also support us is by giving us positive feedback wherever possible and appropriate this
  may be via the friends and family test surveys, on the NHS choices website, compliment and concern
  forms, letters to the Practice or a simple word to the staff when you attend. Your support and
  encouragement are very much appreciated during these difficult times.

**EMERGENCY CARE** - The Practice is not fully equipped to deal with emergency care and in these situations we would advise you call 999 or attend A&E immediately. Recently we have seen an increase in patients with chest pain, potential broken bones or shortness of breath coming down to the surgery and as a result had to telephone the ambulance. Patients should not come down to the surgery in these cases as it may delay the most appropriate care for your condition.

ACUTE ILLNESS CLINIC - The Acute illness clinic will continue to run each weekday in the Practice. From 1st December 2018 we will ask all patients to arrive at the surgery before 9.30am so that we are able to manage the number of patients seen. You may be seen by a GP or Nurse Practitioner in this clinic.

**NURSE PRACTITIONERS** - As some of you will be aware, Becky Jones and Lottie Cody have been increasing their training and competencies to become Nurse Practitioners. As a result they will be seeing patients in the acute illness clinic for patients with appropriate conditions. Reception may ask you some questions to enable them to direct you to the most appropriate clinician. As with all staff within the Practice, we are bound by confidentiality rules and so anything you tell Reception staff will remain private and confidential. It is important that we are able to do this to maximise the use of appointments we have available and to ensure that all patients are being seen by the most appropriate person.

**STAFF TRAINING** - The surgery will be closed for staff training from 1pm on Tuesday 18th December 2018 until 8am on Wednesday 19th December 2018. When considering the staff training afternoon, please could we ask that you order any medication with as much notice as possible to enable us to meet the tight deadlines that we face. A minimum of two working days' notice is required please. For those that don't already use the service, we have facilities to order your medication online at any time, please see Dispensary for more details.

### Winter Gardening Tasks
