FROM YOUR PARISH PRIEST

My dear friends,

A VOW OF POVERTY

None of us has taken one of these, agreed to live as a poor person simply for the love of God, and in the sure belief that God will meet our needs. Not necessarily our wants, but certainly our needs.

My sister has. She became a nun many years ago. She owns nothing, and is content with a simple lifestyle because she and God know how much they love one another.

She isn't the only one I know. The Community of the Resurrection is a society of priests and laymen living at Mirfield, near Huddersfield, who have each taken a similar vow, together with vows of chastity and stability. In this way they have made themselves open to whatever work God has called them to anywhere in the world.

Years ago, when many things were very different, they did sterling work in Southern Africa. You'll have heard of Trevor Huddleston. You'll know of Desmond Tutu. They, and indeed Nelson Mandela, all have a part in the Community's story in Africa.

They still train priests in this country. I owe them a debt of gratitude for they were absolutely key people in my own journey to ordination, and also in the training of one of our retired priests. I am still in close touch with them, and one of them is my own Spiritual Director. He is, if you like, my parish priest, just as I am yours.

They have fallen on hard times. Where they were once 60 in number, they are now fewer than 20. And their age profile goes in reverse; those whom I remember from my student days as in their 30s are now in their 70s.

Not only are they old and worn out. So is their monastery. As a monastery, it is almost beyond repair.

But it could be turned into something else, and they move to a new, smaller, more appropriate building somewhere else on the site. Their very fine church, a place of pilgrimage for many, also needs major refurbishment.

So they needed to get an appeal under way. I mentioned this some time ago. They have managed to raise about £350,000 towards the £2,000,000 they need. But not only are they poor men (by definition), also, they don't know many rich people. The people they know are priests like me, comfortable, perhaps, but not wealthy.

We've done our bit for them. I've done my bit for them. In this month of the Resurrection, might you, or someone you know, be able to do something too?

It would be wonderful if more of us could do something to support people who, for Jesus' sake, have made themselves as poor as he was.

BISHOP'S LETTER

Dear friends

I was sent an unusual email the other day: it was a series of colourful slides taken from the Hubble space telescope and from the various probes that have been launched towards our heavenly neighbours. The images are truly magnificent and demonstrate how the countless billions of stars and planets can seem like specks of dust in the vast reaches of the universe, but when they combine together as a galaxy and become massive conglomerations, the size of which are beyond our ability to comprehend and encompass, they appear as massive, vividly coloured bodies resembling the shape of a crab or an ant. One particular image, taken from the Cassini probe, looks back over rings of Saturn to a small blue dot light-years away: it is the planet Earth. The image was accompanied with the following words...

All our wars All our problems All our greatness and misery All our technology Our art, our advances All our civilisations All our wildlife and flora All races, religions All governments, countries and states I billion souls in constant agitation

It is making the point that a lot of the problems, fears, anxieties and concerns that we have in our everyday life should seem insignificant when we get them into context and realise how small and petty they often are when confronted with the vastness of the universe. I am sure that this is true, and that our natural self-centredness seeks to put us at the centre of creation rather than realising that we are only one tiny part of it. But I wonder how this understanding plays out when we are faced with the ongoing troubles in North Africa and the Middle East? Of course, we must be concerned about the global issues raised by dictatorships and authoritarian governments; about regime change and the ultimate values of justice, peace and equality: these are the great concerns that we must all have and must be prepared to work for. Is there not, though, space for the small, powerless and insignificant? Other words come to my mind when I ask myself this question: *Are not two sparrows sold for a penny? Yet not one of them falls to the ground unperceived by your Father. So do not be afraid, you are of more value than the sparrows.* In the middle of the clashing gongs of world-changing drama, we might also have a care and thought for the little people who are crushed and destroyed as regimes and world-orders fall and rise, for it is they who feel the pain and hurt and whose small moments on Earth are affected for ever.

One of the most important lessons we learnt after the First World War was that we must never have a disregard again for the importance of the life of the individual; no more should we debase humanity by seeing it as cannon fodder. The same fights for the rights of the individual are being played out today, not just in Libya but in our own land as well. In the name of the God who has counted every hair on our heads, the Church needs to be a lively part of that struggle.

Like any good mother, when Karen found out that another baby was on the way, she did what she could to help her 3-year-old son, Michael, prepare for a new sibling. They found out that the new baby was going to be a girl, and day after day, night after night, Michael sang to his sister in Mummy's tummy. He was building a bond of love with his little sister before he even met her.

The pregnancy progressed normally for Karen, an active member of the United Methodist Church in their local town. In time, the labour pains came. Soon it was every five minutes, every three ...every minute. But serious complications arose during delivery and Karen found herself in hours of labour. Would a C-section be required? Finally, after a long struggle, Michael's little sister was born. But she was in a **very serious condition**.

With a siren howling in the night, the ambulance rushed the infant to the neonatal intensive care unit at the nearby hospital. The days inched by. The little girl got worse. The paediatrician had to tell the parents, "There is very little hope. Be prepared for the worst."

Karen and her husband contacted a local cemetery about a burial plot. They had fixed up a special room in their house for their new baby but now they found themselves having to plan for a funeral.

Michael, however, kept begging his parents to let him see his sister. "I want to sing to her," he kept saying.

Week two in intensive care looked as if a funeral would come before the week was over. Michael kept nagging about singing to his sister, but kids are never allowed in Intensive Care. Karen made up her mind, though. She would take Michael whether they liked it or not! If he didn't see his sister right then, he may never see her alive.

She dressed him in an oversized scrub suit and marched him into ICU. He looked like a walking laundry basket. But the head nurse recognized him as a child and bellowed, "Get that kid out of here now! No children are allowed."

The mother rose up strong in Karen, and the usually mild-mannered lady glared steel-eyed right into the head nurse's face, her lips a firm line. "He is not leaving until he sings to his sister!" Karen towed Michael to his sister's bedside. He gazed at the tiny infant losing the battle to live.

After a moment, he began to sing. In the pure-hearted voice of a 3-year-old, Michael sang: "*You are my sunshine, my only sunshine, you make me happy when skies are grey...*" Instantly the baby girl seemed to respond. The pulse rate began to calm down and become steady.

"Keep on singing, Michael," encouraged Karen with tears in her eyes. "You never know, dear, how much I love you, Please don't take my sunshine away..." As Michael sang to his sister, the baby's ragged, strained breathing became as smooth as a kitten's purr.

"Keep on singing, sweetheart !!!"

"*The other night, dear, as I lay sleeping, I dreamed I held you in my arms...*" Michael's little sister began to relax as rest, healing rest, seemed to sweep over her.

"Keep on singing, Michael." Tears had now conquered the face of the bossy head nurse. Karen glowed. "*You are my sunshine, my only Sunshine. Please don't, take my sunshine away...*" The next, day ... the very next day ... the little girl was well enough to go home!

Woman's Day Magazine called it "The Miracle of a Brother's Song." The medical staff just called it a miracle. Karen called it a miracle of God's love!

GLASTONBURY ABBEY

The legend tells us how Joseph of Arimathea; in whose garden-tomb the body of Jesus found rest, came with twelve companions to preach Christianity in Britain. They paused toward the end of their journey on Wearyall Hill to rest and consider their future task. It is said that Joseph stuck his staff into the ground and it grew into a thorn bush, which ever after flowered on Christmas Day. This staff was said to be a cutting from the thorn bush from which Jesus' crown of thorns came and from then on it always prospered on that hill.

Here the pilgrims were kindly received by the local chieftain, who refused to be baptized, allowed them to settle and preach on Avalon. Joseph is said to have brought with him the Holy Grail, which was used by Jesus at the Last Supper. It is always difficult to tell over the mists of time where truth ends and legend begins, for after so long the two often become entwined; it is said the Joseph built the first Christian church in Great Britain on Glastonbury Tor. He built it with the same material that the local inhabitants built their houses and which we know as wattle and daub. The Saxons named the area Avalon which means Apple-Tree Isle.

The Saxons came to Glastonbury in 658AD and were themselves Christian by this time. The fourth church to be built on the holy place was built by King Ine of Wessex at a cost of thirty thousand pounds. A colossal sum at that time. There will always be a mystery surrounding Glastonbury, woven by its eighteen centuries of history. The last abbot was hanged on Tor Hill; at the dissolution of the monasteries the abbot hid the church's fabulous wealth and refused to tell of its hiding place, so he was imprisoned at Wells.

Over the centuries the fame and wealth of Glastonbury grew and many pilgrims came to worship at this, one of the loveliest of Christian shrines, but of course it could not avoid the greedy eyes of Henry VIII who at the dissolution, filled his own and his cronies' pockets with wealth that had previously been dedicated to the worship of God and the relief of the poor.

The last abbot, who was a sick and frail old man refused to tell where he had hidden the wealth of Glastonbury, so they lashed him to a hurdle, dragged him up Tor Hill to the church and hanged him there; his body was cut into four parts and sent to different parts of the country and his head stuck on the gateway to the abbey, but the greedy kings never did get the abbey's treasure, nor did he get the son and heir he so badly wanted.

My name is Barry Denton, some of you will know who I am, having grown up in Normanby and now living up Owmby Cliff. 

NORMANBY-BY-SPITAL PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

The meeting held on 16th February began with PCSO Angie Raper saying that there had been no reported incidents during the last month in our village even though the Chairman had reported some suspicious looking people along Private Lane. Apparently PSCO Angie Raper had been hoping to stay in our area but has been transferred to Gainsborough, she was thanked for her time and then left the meeting.

District Councillor Jeff Summers explained that due to cutbacks the swimming pool complex in Market Rasen has been deferred for 2 years, but there is to be a "pot" of money in three different funds to be available to any group or organisation that has a project in mind that will benefit their area. There is still the Councillor Initiative Fund of £4,000 over 2 years for smaller projects. The project must be justified and match funded. A discussion then followed about the possibility of finding land for a play area. WLDC are considering building a Crematorium in or around Gainsborough, but there will not be a Council Tax rise this year.

Jeff was thanked for attending the meeting and left.

Concerns were noted regarding the proposed new property for the Dalmally site.

The meeting proper did not start until 8.25pm. Councillors M Crowe, J Brindley and Mrs A Crowther could not attend. The usual Highways matters are still awaiting resolution, the takeover of the Cemetery is getting nearer. A quote has been received to renovate the War Memorial, though there may be a problem in moving it.

Election nomination papers are available and the deadline date to get these papers back to WLDC is noon on Monday 4th April.

Due to three Councillors missing it was agreed to defer discussions on the Emergency Plan and the Queen's Diamond Jubilee Year 2012.

Apparently no one has responded to the LIVES request, please think seriously about helping.

The next meeting will be the Annual Parish Meeting and the Annual Parish Council Meeting, being held on Wednesday May 11th. The APM is for everyone to voice their opinion - it is your meeting, so please do try to come along.



Public forum

The state of the Village Hall driveway was mentioned again; quotes have been received and a contractor has been selected and work will begin to repair potholes in the first suitably dry period. Hopefully this will encourage drivers not to drive over the edge of the playing field. Enquiries are in hand for the cost of post and rope fencing along the edge of the driveway. Dog mess is still causing concern to the public and owners are politely requested to clean up after their dogs and to dispose of the waste in the bins provided.

Environmental and highways matters

A complaint has been received about the condition of the footway alongside the A15; a request has been made to the County Council to clear back encroaching grass and mud. Concern has also been raised about heavy goods vehicles mounting the pavement in Caenby Road to allow oncoming vehicles to pass. Any sightings of this dangerous practice should be reported to the Clerk, preferably with a note of the vehicle's details, and these will be passed on to the local PCSO. Efforts continue to have potholes repaired, but the County Council's resources in terms of money and labour are stretched following the recent winter weather. Repairs are being negotiated for damaged fencing around the children's play area. A donation from the Round Table will be used to obtain picnic tables and a set of goal posts for the playing field. Flood defence is under discussion, and a grant from the District Council will be used for the purchase of some items for use in the event of flood risk.

Elections will be held on 5th May at the Village Hall to elect a Parish Council and also a District Councillor.



This is a new telephone service being introduced to help make it easier to access local health services in Lincolnshire.

111 should be used for non-life threatening (non 999) calls - when you don't think it can wait for an appointment with your GP - or you don't know who to call for medical help.

111 will get you through to a team of highly-trained advisers supported by experienced nurses who will assess your symptoms and guide you to the right local service. By using this number it helps to free up 999 and local A&E departments so that they can focus on genuine emergency cases.

If however you are already receiving healthcare and have already been given a specific number to ring by a health professional to call when you are concerned about your condition, please continue to use that number.

From 1st April 2011 the out of hours service covering this and other local practices will only be contactable via the 111 option. There is no charge for this call if dialled direct. Out of hours is normally from 6:30 p.m. - 8:00 a.m. weekdays and from 6:30 p.m. Friday through to 8:00 a.m. Monday and all Bank Holidays.

Our Respiratory Nurse has asked if patients who have been loaned a nebuliser could please return them in a timely manner - please contact the surgery if you need assistance.

Please note : we will be closed for the usual Bank Holidays at Easter and also on Friday 29th April for the Royal Wedding Bank Holiday.

We say goodbye (for the time being) to our first Registrar, Dr Muhammed Adnan who has been working with us since August and will be moving into a hospital post at Lincoln in early April before resuming his GP training here in a couple of years time. 
