
CANON SENDS OPEN LETTER FOR READERS

PRIESTS

From time to time I write a lot about priests. I suppose I think it's important, because the life and work of a priest has changed so much, and I believe people in our villages have a right to know about the changes.

A big change in the Owmby Group and Springline Parishes on Sunday July 3rd. Our very first home-grown candidate will be ordained. Sally Turnbull from Spridlington will be ordained Deacon by the Bishop of Grimsby, in Grimsby, to serve particularly in the Owmby Group of Parishes, but also elsewhere in our deanery, especially in the Springline Parish, just as their local priests minister from time to time in the Owmby Group.

As a deacon for her first year of ordination, Sally isn't a priest yet, and doesn't preside at Holy Communion, but she will take a major role in the Holy Communion service, and be taking a lot more other services than she has done up to now. She will be, if you like, an apprentice priest, and be ordained priest in a year's time.

And at the same time as Sally becomes a priest, in July 2012, Julia Hepburn from Burton will be ordained Deacon to serve mainly in the Springline Parish, but also in the Owmby Group. And so the process goes on. There are other local candidates looking at local ordination.

We are growing our own priests.

BISHOP'S LETTER

Dear Friends,

Reverberations from the Panorama investigation into abuse at a residential home in Bristol continue to raise questions about the quality of care and protection afforded to the most vulnerable in our society. As well as the specific issues raised by the terrible suffering highlighted in that programme, there is a bigger question about our attitude as a community to those who, for whatever reason, are vulnerable to the abusive behaviour of others.

Vulnerability is a symptom of being human. It is a constant of childhood, yet at different times and in different ways we all find ourselves vulnerable - to those who care for us, to those who teach us, to those who employ us and especially to those that we love. A healthy community, like a healthy home or a healthy workplace, is built upon a trust that those with power will not take advantage of our vulnerabilities.

At its heart, safeguarding the vulnerable, whether they are children or adults, is about ensuring that we live up to that trust which others need from us. Safeguarding is a collective responsibility and we cannot opt out on grounds of not interfering. If we become aware that someone's vulnerability is being abused, then we need to speak out lest our silence compounds the actions of the abusers - for silence in such circumstances gives consent. Yet 'speaking out' too frequently runs contrary to a sub-culture in an office, care home or in any place which has learned to normalise the behaviour of those who abuse their power. 'Whistleblowers' can themselves become victims of the powerful by being treated as the problem and a threat, rather than agents of health and justice.

To me this isn't just about what happens in care homes, hospitals or places of work - it is fundamental to recognising that each person's dignity is given by God, in whose image we are made. So there is a Christian dimension to all this and protecting the dignity of the vulnerable isn't about political correctness or about human rights, it runs deeper than that. Jesus puts it exactly when telling a story about sheep and goats in Matthew's Gospel, when he says "I tell you the truth, whatever you did not do for one of the least of these, you did not do for me" (25:45).

GLASTONBURY ABBEY

In the April edition of Signpost, I told the story of how the holy tree grew from the staff of Joseph of Arimathea after he struck it into the ground whilst resting on Wearyall Hill.

A week after delivery of the Signpost, an article with photographs appeared in the 26th of March edition of the Daily Mail explaining how three months before Christmas, mindless hooligans had vandalised the holy tree by cutting it down.

Several well-meaning individuals had tried to help, by anointing the wounds of the tree with such things as marmalade, mead and on one occasion, Guinness. Nothing seemed to work until the council enlisted the help of a local horticulturalist, Peter Frearson.

Mr Frearson had his own remedy for the salvation of this holy tree which involved coating the wounds with pine resin and beeswax to stop the ingress of bacteria and fungus. He then wrapped the tree in horticultural fleece, bubble wrap, more fleece and then hessian. The base was mulched with well rotted wood chip, then spikes were driven into the ground and the holes produced were filled with compost and bone meal. This appears to be working, for the Mayor of Glastonbury, Councillor John Coles, has just reported the growth of new buds which he described as "wonderful news for the town."

The poet and painter, William Blake (1757 - 1827) wrote an epic poem about the area around Glastonbury called "Jerusalem" which he completed in 1818. This poem was eventually set to music by the well known Victorian composer Sir Charles Hubert Hastings Parry.

"Jerusalem" appears to have been taken up by the Women's Suffrage Movement in 1917 and thereafter it was inherited by the Woman's Institute. But who can fail to be moved on hearing it sung to close the Last Night of the "Proms"?

Let us hope these mindless individuals who commited the ultimate sacrilage get their just reward. As I said once before - "God does not pay His debts with money"

WHAT SIZE IS YOUR SOCIETY?

We all live as members of a social network, whether small, or large. One way of visualising your network is to place yourself at the centre of a series of circles which spread out further and further like ripples on a pond. The first circle would contain our family, then come friends, neighbours, work colleagues, acquaintances and so on as far as you wish to go. The boundaries are not perfect as there is going to be some overlapping and here a Venn diagram might reveal some interesting cases where persons belong to more than one group because they have more than one connection to us. But as members of society there are certainly many, many connections between us.

Now Mrs. Thatcher famously said in 1987 that "there is no such thing as society, there are individual men and women, and there are families." She went on to say "There is a living tapestry of men and women and the beauty of that tapestry and the quality of our lives depend on how much each of us is prepared to take responsibility for ourselves. And each of us, by our own efforts, is prepared to turn round and help those less fortunate." She, I believe, was taking a rather limited view of society as being what most often is termed "the (welfare) state" as she was exhorting people to take more responsibility for their own lives and futures and not expect the state to meet their needs. Perhaps her "tapestry" is comprised of a vast collection of concentric circles overlapping and inter-connecting in a vivid way.

We have moved on considerably, in time at least from 1987, and our present prime minister has introduced us to his vision of the Big Society. Its stated aim is "to create a climate that employs local people and communities, building a big society that will take power away from politicians and give it to people." Well, its early days yet, and much has been written for and against and there is much to clarify and argue about. But there is a place for you and me, we will be there somewhere, and much will depend on our choices as to where that will be.


NORMANBY & OWMBY

SIGNPOST MAGAZINE

One of the considerable strengths of our village life is Signpost magazine, now coming towards twenty years old.

Signpost flags up both church and village events, and also carries many reports of what is going on in our villages. It is financed largely by advertising, but since the beginning has also relied on donations, especially from those groups and individuals which use it to publicise their activities.

Signpost needs money for two reasons. Firstly, since Colin Rainer retired, we pay our editor, Steve Harvey. Not a lot, but in recognition of the very considerable task editing Signpost now is. Secondly, the cost of printing is high, between £300 - £400 each month, depending on the number of pages.

At present there is a gap between income and expenditure of roughly $\pounds 1,000$ a year. When Signpost began, churches and parish councils were asked to donate $\pounds 100$ a year towards running costs. Some have always done so, and Signpost is most grateful for this enthusiastic support. Others haven't always.

It's time perhaps not only to reiterate our need for this support from every organisation that makes use of the magazine, but also to say that since our costs have, inevitably, risen over the years, we need greater support. We would be very grateful if churches, village halls and parish councils and meetings who might have given £100 up to now could see their way to supporting the magazine to the tune of £150 per year. In at least one village, this is met from the Parish Precept. Perhaps smaller organisations could make a proportionate increase.

Groups located outside of the direct Signpost area (Hackthorn, Spridlington, Saxby, Owmby, Normanby, Glentham) we must ask to be particularly generous in their support. A page of Signpost actually costs £30 per month.

Our fear is that without this level of support, in two years' time the magazine could become unviable.

Council matters

Copies of meeting minutes are regularly placed on both notice boards (the other is outside the Village Hall) together with current notices, so it is worth a look to keep up to date with local events.

Work will soon be under way to repair and renovate the fencing around the children's playground, which will improve both safety and its appearance. Flower tubs have been purchased and will soon be making an appearance with some new picnic tables by the Village Hall.

The Council's finances have been submitted to the external authorities for audit; the results of the examination will be published on the notice boards for public scrutiny.

The Council is delighted to have received an application from Glentham resident Mark Dowthwaite to be co-opted onto the Council. This was done on 2nd June and Mark is now a fully-fledged Councillor, and is very welcome. There is still one more vacancy and applications are invited.

Environmental, highways and other matters

As ever, there are repairs to roads and footways needed, and Lincolnshire County Council is constantly being asked to complete them. Potholes in Church Close and path resurfacing in Bishop Norton Road are among priorities, and the County Council promises the problem of the falling earth bank in Back Lane will be addressed this year. The crumbling footpath from Bishop Norton Road to Little Lane is the responsibility of ACIS, and they have been asked to make repairs.





WELTON HEALTH CENTRE NEWS

We have had a recent spate of concerns about our telephone system and are liasing with the company to try and improve the situation. For information, on a random Monday morning we had 457 people attempting to access the surgery via telephone between 8.00 and 9.00am! 278 of these were rejected as more than 20 in the queuing system - which gives an indication of the volume of traffic the 'phone system deals with. We have now changed the system to allow up to the maximum of 50 people to wait, and all should be told where they are in that queue. We also received some comments about the lines not being open at 8.30am and upon checking, the engineer found that the clock was 90 seconds slow and has now reset this so the opening time should now be correct. We are currently working with the provider to look at options to improve access and apologise to anyone who has experienced any difficulty with our system.

We have said farewell to two colleagues this week - Dr Jeanette Barber has left to take a career break and Nurse Judy Green has taken early retirement from the Practice. We will miss them both but wish them all the very best. We have been advised that we will be having another two GP Registrars joining the Practice in August as part of the vocational training scheme and look forward to welcoming them to the team.

Finally a total of 48 patients failed to attend booked appointments during April and we were notified of another 28 hospital appointments which were not kept. As always, please help us by cancelling if unable to keep so that others may benefit.
