WELTON LIBRARY AND COMMUNITY HUB

As many of you may be aware Welton Library and Community Hub moved to Manor Park on Hackthorn Road at Welton a few months ago. The library, which is supported by the Parish Council and run by volunteers, remains part of the Lincolnshire Libraries service so existing membership cards can still be used. We welcome residents from all local villages who wish to use our services whether that be to borrow books, use our modern free internet linked computers or free Wi-Fi for your own device.

Manor Park has excellent parking, a children's playground and the library itself benefits from use of a purpose built extension as well as the pavillion to allow us to stock 5,000 adult's and children's fiction and non fiction titles.

Our opening hours are: Monday 1pm - 6pm, Tuesday 9.30am - 2.30pm, Wednesday 10am - 1pm. It's free to join and use the library and you don't need any I.D so it's all very straightforward. Just call in to see us at Manor Park...the postcode is LN2 3PA if using a sat nav.

LETTER FROM THE MINISTRY TEAM

Who do you think you are? Do you have an interest in family history and genealogy? Perhaps you are researching your family background and have accessed documents, parish registers and census information. Many of us are curious to find out where we came from; we want to find out about the lives of our ancestors, who, even though they died many years ago, lived lives with stories to tell.

The television series "Who Do You Think You Are?" is one of the most popular programmes on the BBC where people who have agreed to lay bare their family history are helped to use archive documents to trace back their ancestors. The programme shows us a different side to people we might call "household names".

One of the first people to be on the programme was Jeremy Paxman. We might think of him as a hard-nosed journalist and the scourge of politicians, but Paxman was reduced to tears when, examining archive documents, he discovered the life of poverty, shame and rejection of his Great-Great -Grandmother. He discovered that she was abandoned and forced to bring up nine children, including an illegitimate child, in a Glasgow tenement in abject and unsanitary conditions. The experience was humbling and emotional for Jeremy and his reaction was to say, 'We're just don't know we're born, do we?'

My own family history was passed down to me by my late family and, sadly, there is now no one left from the earlier generations to fill in the gaps of their stories. However, thanks to one of my brothers who researched and wrote down his findings I do have some very precious records about my family. I was humbled when I discovered many of my relatives had not been well off or well-educated or indeed had not led blameless lives. Following my Mother's line I found out that her father was a notorious figure; a violent man who had travelled the world as a ship's fireman and spent more than one term in prison for fighting and causing a disturbance. People researching family history often uncover things which bring great joy and sometimes they uncover secrets that they find shocking.

The Bible is a great archive; throughout The Old and New Testaments we learn about the lives of many families. In the New Testament, St Matthew's Gospel begins with the genealogy of Jesus. His family history goes back 42 generations to Abraham which is far more than anyone on "Who Do You Think You Are" can trace! Jesus is born when his parents are travelling to Bethlehem; He is born in a cold, dark and unsanitary place. He is born at a time when there was great political uncertainty and after His birth His parents made a desperate choice to travel even further as refugees. His beginning was not promising.

Jesus life continued to be one of hardship. He moved from place to place, sometimes welcomed as a great healer and teacher, sometimes run out of town because he was seen as a trouble maker. His death, as His life, was one of pain and suffering. We know from The Gospels that throughout His Ministry Jesus grew in the knowledge and acceptance of who He was and what God had sent him to do. His identity was not in the 42 generations of family history but was in The Living God whom He called Abba (Daddy). Jesus showed love and kindness, irrespective of status and preached forgiveness for wrongdoing. Being a Christian is not easy. We need to accept that we are called to be a disciple of Christ by following in His footsteps. If we do this we will grow in the knowledge of who we really are.

FROM THE OFFICE OF THE BISHOP OF GRANTHAM

Dear Friends

On 8th June the RAF 100 baton relay enters the Diocese of Lincoln by crossing the Humber Bridge. During the month of June the relay will visit Scampton, Coningsby, Cranwell, Digby, Waddington and Lincoln Cathedral. It will visit 27 Bomber Command airfields in the county and also the new International Bomber Command Centre and memorial.

The length of time that the relay will spend in Lincolnshire indicates how important the RAF has been and is to our county and region.

I am quite moved by the idea of the relay. It is to be run entirely by volunteers, all of whom have a connection to the RAF. This in itself will demonstrate how deeply the service has influenced the life and the landscape of Lincoln. Moreover, when I say 'run', actually the baton will also be carried for part of its journey on horseback, by boat and by parachute; ingenuity is to be involved. Finally, every baton carrier will have to complete their own challenge: they will be given just a start point and an end point for their leg, which means that they will have to work out the route for themselves as a piece of orienteering.

Here is a participative, collaborative event, which also draws on individual energy, courage and ingenuity, all with a shared purpose: to give thanks for the contribution of the RAF to the protection of the nation and the pursuit of peace, and to root that work in the soil of the past so that it may continue to flourish whatever the future might bring.

Society depends upon participation, collaboration and individual effort. In every generation, people have to pick up the baton of the past and carry it through the present into the future.

It is the same with faith: it is a great joy for the Christian to be given the flame of faith that has been tended by someone else, to allow that flame to burn in one's own life, and through one's life of faith perhaps to kindle new faith in others.

In greater Lincolnshire we stand on the shoulders of generations of people who have prayed to God, cared for their neighbours and shared the story of Jesus with those who would follow in their footsteps. The baton of faith - the flame of faith - has been carried with care and love, ingenuity and effort, since the first missionaries came to this part of England many centuries ago.

As during this month of June we may share in the RAF 100 relay, either as spectators or participants, I hope that what we witness in this event may also strengthen our life of faith, and encourage us as we each carry the baton and flame that every Christian was given when we were baptised.

My prayers are with those who serve in the RAF today, those who have served in the RAF in the past, and with all who worship and serve in our congregations and parishes - thank you - and may you take heart from these words in the Letter to the Hebrews:

'Therefore, since we are surrounded by so great a cloud of witnesses, let us also lay aside every weight and the sin that clings so closely, and let us run with perseverance the race that is set before us, looking to Jesus the pioneer and perfecter of our faith, who for the sake of the joy that was set before him endured the cross, disregarding its shame, and has taken his seat at the right hand of the throne of God'. (12:1-2. NRSV).





WELTON FAMILY HEALTH CENTRE NEWS

DR HOWARD - The Practice would like to thank patients for their kind words of condolence at the sad loss of Dr Howard in February. The kind comments and thoughts left in the condolence book will now be passed onto the family and will, I'm sure, give them great comfort to know how well respected Dr Howard was. In addition to this some patients gave donations in memory of Dr Howard (for The British Heart Foundation and The Scouting Association) and these too have been passed onto the family. The practice would also like to thank the Patient and Doctor's Association for donating the proceeds of their Spring Lunch raffle to these worthy causes - an amazing sum of £315 was raised.

HOME VISTS - Please could we ask that if you are making a request for a home visit that you only do so if you are genuinely housebound.

Each week we are requested to attend several patients' homes for visits and occasionally they have 'popped to the shops' or are 'at the hairdressers'. As each home visit takes considerably longer than seeing a patient in the surgery, unnecessary requests place additional pressure on the service we are aiming to provide.

If you are able to attend the surgery but have no means of transport, we have a wonderful driving scheme that is managed by the Patient and Doctor's Association and for a small fee they are able to transport you to and from the surgery (as well as longer distances, if required). Please enquire at reception for more information.

TEXT MESSAGING - We are once again sending out a plea to all patients that haven't already done so to sign up for text messaging services. We are able to send out appointment confirmations and will be hoping to develop the system to allow us to do more in the forthcoming months. If you haven't yet signed up to this service, please see reception for a form.

DNA's - In April, 20 patients did not attend for their appointment with the doctor and 83 patients did not attend for their appointment with the nurse - a total of 17 hours' worth of appointments over the month. Thank you, as always, to those patients that did make their appointments, we appreciate your help and support.

STAFF TRAINING - The surgery will be closed for staff training from 1pm on Tuesday 19h June until 8am on Wednesday 20th June. When considering the staff training afternoon, please could we ask that you order any medication with as much notice as possible to enable us to meet the tight deadlines that we face. A minimum of forty eight working hours' notice is required please.
